

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Program Notes

In 2022, I received a note from a band director that said I wrote "Too Much Percussion." While it was not quite phrased this way, as those who follow my shenanigans on social media will already know, that was the "gist" of it. Close enough for government work, as they say.

Since that time, I have adopted that phrase as a badge of honor. After all, being a percussionist myself, I don't see the problem here.

Too Much Percussion for Christmas! (Trash the Halls!) is a medley of holiday tunes set to a 1950's/60's -esque groove and adorned with, you guessed it, too much percussion! In this piece, you will hear Deck the Halls, Jingle Bells, Jolly Old St. Nicholas, Up on the Housetop, The Twelve Days of Christmas, and more. There is also a special moment where the percussion section is featured, playing trash cans because...why not?

I hope you enjoy this collection of holiday tunes, and remember that, around the holidays, when you can't think of the perfect gift... you can't go wrong with more percussion.

Performance Notes:

- -It is highly recommended that the trash cans be staged up front so that the audience can clearly see the percussionists. In addition to this, there is choreography that goes with the section. A video of the choreography and an explanation of the movers will be available on the product page for this piece on our website by September 1, 2024. It would have been earlier, but at the time of this writing, I am one arm short due to an arm surgery.
- -In Measure 39, replace the "X" with the number of drummers that will be drumming on the trash cans.
- -Measures 40 through 43 may be repeated as many times as necessary to add in players. I encourage using as many percussionist and non-percussionist on the trashcan part as possible. If you can even teach an administrator or other school dignitaries the part, this would be an excellent way to showcase them.
- -The giant whip crack used near the end of the piece should be at least 8 feet, if not bigger. Be sure to bring it out where the audience can clearly see what is being done. I also highly recommend taking videos of this and posting them on social media. Be sure to tag me. Help a composer out.
- -The percussion instruments for the wind players can be anything. ANYTHING! As long as they can hit it without earning legal repercussions, it will work. If you find yourself short a few instruments, body percussion will work. However, you might consider a bunch of Sleigh Bells or other holiday type of noisemakers. Add choreo and above all, HAVE FUN!
- -The style of the piece is Rock. Please do not play it "politely." Santa is watching you.
- -The percussion 1 part may be played by one person on drumset if needed. Please refer to the Drum Guide in the score
- -No percussionists should sit out. If you happen to have more than ten percussionists, double up. If you find a few wandering on the street, invite them in. The more, the merrier!
- -Please make use of the educational materials that can be found on the product page for this work on our website.

Randall Standridge (b.1976) received his Bachelor of Music Education from Arkansas State University. During this time, he studied composition with Dr. Tom O'Connor, before returning to Arkansas State University to earn his Master's in Music Composition, studying with Dr. Tom O'Connor and Dr. Tim Crist. His music is gaining recognition as worthwhile literature for concert festivals and performances across the United States and internationally.
